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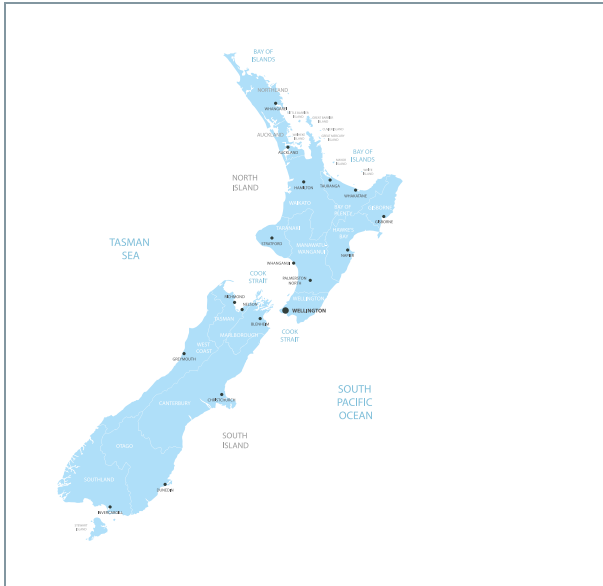
Current trends in the New Zealand education system

New Zealand has eight state universities, 18 universities of applied sciences, three wānangas (Maori higher education institutions) and nine state research organisations. There are also seven crown research institutes (CRI), which were set up by the government in 1992 as corporatised entities that carry out application-oriented research. There are also 105 private institutions.

In recent years the government has instigated significant increases in funding for STEM subjects. The focus for the natural sciences is on applications, and interconnections with business are deliberately sought out. Space travel has also gained considerable significance as a research area, with commercial unmanned space flight playing an increasingly important economic role. At the same time, New Zealand is rich in biodiversity and natural environments. Working in cooperation with Germany there is much interest in the climate and renewable energy. Green hydrogen is seen as a field with potential for future development.

Education in New Zealand is a major component of the economy and export factor. Spending on education accounted for 6.16 per cent of GDP in 2018, substantially more than Germany, at 4.25 per cent. The OECD average is 4.88 per cent. (Source: *Education at a Glance, OECD 2021*). As in Australia, fees paid by foreign students make a significant contribution to funding higher education institutions.

Depending on subject and degree level (undergraduate/postgraduate studies), these range from 22,000 to 37,000 NZD per year for international students (roughly 13,240 – 22,300 euros p/a). The government subsidises tuition fees for New Zealand students. An agreement has been in place with the DAAD since 2020, whereby DAAD scholarship holders whose courses last at least ten months are exempt from international tuition fees (this does not apply to the PROMOS programme).

A DAAD lectureship has existed at the University of Auckland since 2006. Another lectureship was set up at Canterbury Christ Church University in 2021.

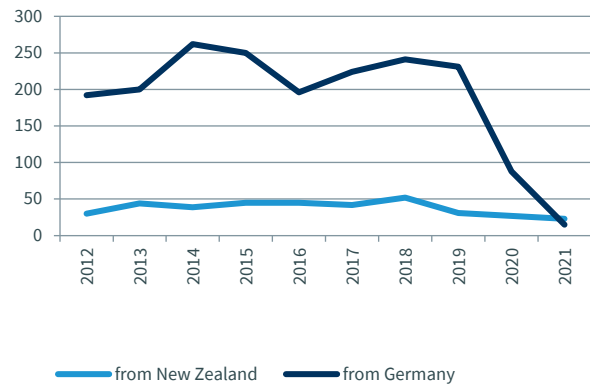
In addition, a new PPP (Programme for Project-Related Personal Exchange) was signed by the DAAD and Education New Zealand (ENZ) in November 2021. In April 2022 the programme announced its first call for applications for funding in 2023 and 2024.

Scholarships for foreign graduates and artists are particularly significant in terms of individual funding.

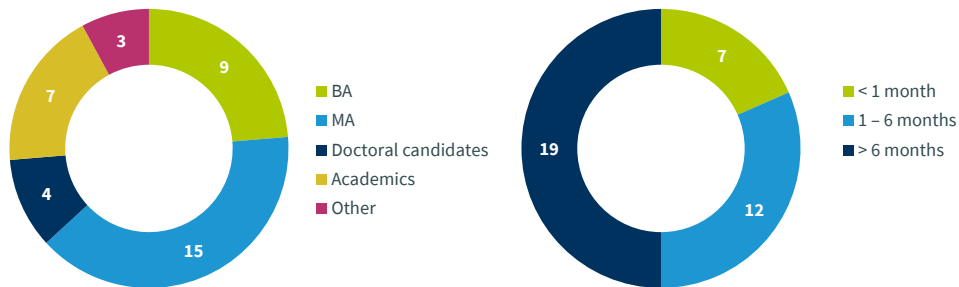
